AT A GLANCE

A. Bangladesh Chamber of Industries (BCI) is the sole and exclusive chamber of the industrial community both public and private sector in Bangladesh. Bangladesh Chamber of Industries was formed and got the approval of the Government since 1985. It is a matter of honor for a member company to be part of the organization. Any company can give its inputs during a policy formulation process that may influence its business. BCI undertakes various lobbying activities for upholding the collective interest of various sectors. Upon becoming a member of BCI, any organization will get the opportunity to enjoy all the services offered by the Chamber.

D. Principal Functions:



Annual Report 2024-2025

Bismillahir Rahmanir Rahim

Distinguished members of
Bangladesh Chamber of Industries,
dear colleagues, ladies & gentleman and guests.

Assalamu alaikum,

At the out-set I would like to extend my heartfelt thanks to you all for coming here and being present today at the 39th Annual General Meeting of BCI. It's my privilege to welcome you and convey my best wishes for the coming year 2026 on behalf of BCI and on my behalf. Your presence today is a testament of your commitment to our chamber.

AGM every year gives us an opportunity to interact and dialogue with all of you that deepens our friendship and cordiality in our efforts to take this chamber to an elevated height of excellence.

BCI being the most representative trade chamber of Industries across the country should play a vital role in terms of employment creation as well as in fostering & consolidating industrial base and economic development all over the country. In this respect let us recall the contribution of our late Directors and Members with due honor and respect and pray to Almighty Allah for salvation of their departed souls.

Before briefing on BCI activities, I would like to draw your kind attention at a glimpse on Bangladesh economy during the period under report:

At a crossroads to upper middle income and LDC graduation, Bangladesh faces intertwined challenges in the short and medium terms. Bangladesh's economic growth over the past decade has faced challenges in recent years. Real GDP growth is estimated to have moderated marginally to 3.97 percent in FY25 from 4.2 percent in FY24. Other notable problems are: Business operation cost increases 30%; Production dropped by 35-40%; Energy crisis, Private sector credit growth-6.29 in October, Poverty level increases 18.70% in 2022 to 21.2% in 2025. Unemployment rate rises to 5.08%, Labour force participation dropped -20 lac employment was less in FY-23-24, in the year 2025 over last 6 months employment abroad is less 23% comparing previous year, Mob culture, Weak law and Order situation, Bureaucracy is not functional and Interim Govt. is not interacting with business communities. Despite recent moderation, inflation has remained elevated, financial sector vulnerabilities have worsened (Classified A/C- March'25 - Tk-420,335Cr - 24.13%, and September'25 - Tk-6, 44,000 Cr around 34%. Country total debt-38.61% of GDP, External debt to GDP-24.30%) and investment growth slowed. Growth is expected to rebound gradually over the medium-term. To achieve its vision of attaining upper middle-income status, Bangladesh needs to create jobs through a competitive business environment, increase human capital and build a skilled labor force, build efficient

infrastructure, and establish a policy environment that attracts private investment. Development priorities include diversifying exports beyond the RMG sector; move to low cost to high value production; capture the potentials of Halal products market at home and abroad; more emphasize on Light Engineering, Agro-machinery, Automobiles, Blue Economy, Electronic assembly, AI and IT. Resolving financial sector vulnerabilities; making urbanization more sustainable and strengthening public institutions, including fiscal reforms to generate more domestic revenue for development. Addressing infrastructure gaps would accelerate growth. While planning for long term goal external factors must be factored such as- The ongoing Ukraine War, Middle East tensions and recent tariff-based trade doctrine under the Trump administration (2025). Addressing vulnerability to climate change and natural disasters will help Bangladesh to continue to build resilience to future shocks.

We all know our strength is our young people, and we have about 8 core people of average 26 years old. A recent study “Beyond Jobless Growth: Rethinking Youth Employment in Bangladesh through a Post-Neoliberal Lens” highlights a reality we can no longer ignore, despite impressive GDP growth. Bangladesh is experiencing structural jobless growth; particularly manufacturing industry loses 1.4 million jobs over last decades. In this context CMSMEs needs to prioritize as the backbone of local economies, women’s entrepreneurship, rural industrialization, and inclusive job creation. Strengthening CMSMEs through easier formalization, access to finance, simplified taxation, market access, and digital tools must be a national priority. Women’s employment also deserves special focus. Recognizing and valuing women’s unpaid and informal work can significantly expand the number of labour force.

I have already mentioned some of the present scenario of our economy/industry, now would like to mention some crucial issues that we need to focus on:

- a) Maintaining the competitiveness of the current industries by enhancing productivity we need smooth supply of Gas and electricity in all industrial areas;
- b) Rationalizing VAT and Tax structure focusing on manufacturing industry growth is urgently needed.
- c) For maintaining effective supply chain and smooth operation of production units we need smooth democratic transition;
- d) Creating more job opportunities & reduce income inequalities we need to focus on sustainable MSME development environment;
- e) Research and innovation in industrial sector needs academia, industry and government joint collaboration;
- f) Product testing and certification needs to be cost effective and entrepreneur friendly;
- g) Creating pipe-line for getting skill workers, technicians, operators, engineers and managers for different manufacturing sectors to address the challenges of LDC graduation;
- h) Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) issues needs to be taken care of in the context of LDC graduation;

- i) Youth entrepreneurships and Start-ups needs support from the relevant government agencies.
- j) CTG port efficiency and high cost of logistics needs to be addressed by the high-up of Gov.

Hope within a short period of time we will move towards a political transition. We also hope that new political government will try to stabilize the law & order situation, improve the governance performance and will value the voices of business community for improving overall economic and business environment of the country for a better Bangladesh.

Now, I would like to let you know some important activities of BCI during the reporting year.

1. A business delegation meets with Honorable Chief Advisor Prof. Dr. Muhammad Yunus on 11 August, 2024 to greet him from the business community upon taking the charge of Chief Advisor of Interim Government. BCI President Mr. Anwar-ul Alam Chowdhury (Parvez) was one of the important members of the delegation.
2. On 20 October, 2025 a team from BCI Board meets with Honorable Industry Advisor Mr. Adilur Rahman Khan to greet him and discuss the prevailing situation of industrial sector at the conference room of the Ministry of Industry. Industry Secretary Ms. Zakia Sultana was also present there.
3. Bangladesh Chamber of Industries (BCI) organized an Orientation Workshop on "National Industrial Policy, 2022" for its members at BCI Board Room on 9 November, 2024 at 10.30 am. The session was presided over by Mrs. Priti Chakraborty, where BCI President Mr. Anwar-ul Alam Chowdhury (Parvez) was present as chief guest and Mr. Md. Salim Ullah, Additional Secretary (Policy), Ministry of Industries was conducted the session. Some BCI directors were also present on that occasion.
4. A high-level business delegation led by BCI President, comprising all sectors of Industrial and Business community meet with Honorable Industry Advisor at the Conference Room of the Ministry of Industries on 18 November, 2024 to discuss about the prevailing situation of Industry and Business at that time. The Advisor patiently hears the voices from the business leaders and assured them to do the best from his end. The Industry Secretary Ms. Zakia Sultana was also present in the meeting.
5. On 23 November, 2024 at 11am BCI organize a Seminar on "Ways of Mitigating Energy Crisis and Way forward" at the Ballroom of The Westin Dhaka. All relevant stakeholders of Industry/ Business/ Academia/ Media were the participant. The Seminar was presided over by President BCI Mr. Anwar-ul Alam Chowdhury (Parvez) and key note paper was presented by Prof. Dr. Ijaz Hossain, Department of Chemical Engineering BUET. Mr. Muhammad Fouzul Kabir Khan, Honorable Advisor to the Ministry of Power, Energy and Mineral Resources was the Chief Guest and Mr. Sk. Bashir Uddin, Honorable Advisor to the Ministry of Commerce was present as the Guest of Honor. The seminar was time befitting and a relevant one.

6. A high-level business delegation led by BCI president meets with Chairman, NBR on 25 November, 2025 to discuss the issues affecting businesses at that time. The meeting was very cordial and a fruitful one.
7. The 38th AGM of BCI was held on 21 December, 2025 at BCI Board Room. The Board of Directors and Members of BCI were present at the AGM. The meeting was presided over by the Board President Mr. Anwar-ul Alam Chowdhury (Parvez) where members discuss about the previous activities and future plans of BCI.
8. A high-level business delegation led by BCI President comprising all sectors of industry and businesses meet with the Governor of Bangladesh Bank Dr. Ahsan H. Mansur on January 12, 2025 to discuss the issues of LC opening, Bank Loan Interest, Export Incentives, Exit Policy, Moratorium etc. The Governor listens from the leaders and instructed officials to solve the problems facing by the businesses at the earliest possible time.
9. Election of the Board of Directors (2025-2027) was held in December, 2024. New Board starts functioning from 14 January, 2025. The Board has got Mr. Anwar-ul Alam Chowdhury (Parvez) as President, Mrs. Priti Chakraborty and Mr. Mohammed Younus as senior vice-presidents and vice president respectively. The Board all together have 24 out of them 16 (sixteen) from Ordinary Member Category and 8 (eight) from Associate Member Category.
10. On 18 January BCI organize a Training Workshop on "Patent, Design and Trademarks (Application and approval procedures). The sessions were conducted by the two deputy directors from DPDT. 26. On 2 August, 2025 BCI organized a Training Workshop on "Applicable laws and rules of Customs and VAT". The inauguration session was presided over by president BCI, Mr. Anwar-ul Alam Chowdhury (Parvez) where Mr. Abdul Hai Sarker

Chairman BAB was present as Chief Guest. Two senior officials from NBR conducted the two sessions of the training workshop.

The CEO’s of leading think-tank (CPD, RAPID, PRI, and PEB) and other notable economist and business leaders were present as discussant. The Round-table was presided and moderated by BCI President.
28. A meeting of the Advisory Panel of BCI Center for MSME Development was held on 23 August, 2025 at BCI Board Room and the meeting was presided over by the Advisory Panel Chairman and BCI President. The meeting was held on Hi- bride model, some members were joining form abroad.
29. Training workshop on” Applicable Laws and rules of Customs and VAT” 2nd batch was held on 30 August, 2025. NBR officials conducted the training workshop. This is demanding training program among the participants.
30. BCI organized a two days Trade Fair on “Road to Made in Bangladesh: Automobiles & Agro- Machinery Fair-2025” at the top floor of BCI office building on 20-21 September, 2025. The fair was a glorious event for BCI. Total 38 Stall/Enterprise participated in the fair, among them 7 from Agro-Machinery Manufactures, 6 from Automobile Manufactures, 12 from Light Engineering Industry, 3 from Bank, 2 from university and 6 from other allied enterprises. The inauguration ceremony was graced by the Honorable Industry Advisor Mr. Adilur Rahman Khan as Chief Guest and the closing ceremony was graced by the Honorable Commerce Advisor Mr. Sk. Bashir Uddin as Chief Guest. The closing ceremony also graced by Dr. Hossin Zillur Rahman, Chairman, PPRC and former Advisor of Caretaker Government as Guest of Honor. The two days fair was eventful and constructive; two seminars were held in two days. 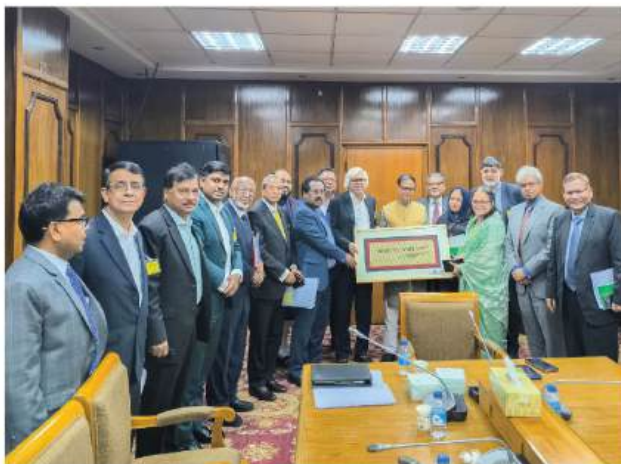

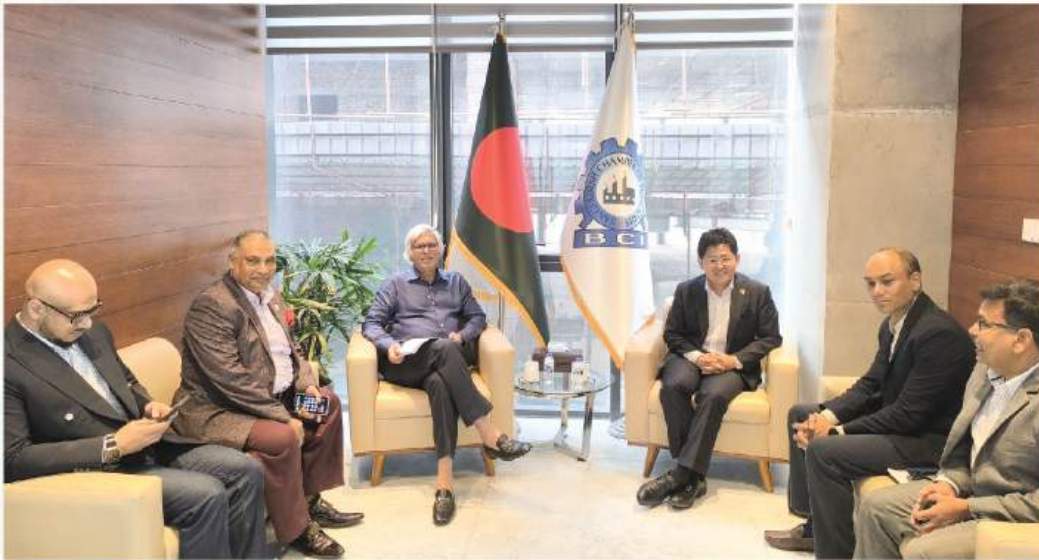

Industrial production stagnating for gas shortage, businesses decry

Energy business opening up for resolving fuel crisis: Adviser

REPORT
Energy business is opening up for industrial production, the adviser concerned. So far, businesses Saturday urged the sector government to take more effective measures for ensuring gas supply to industrial factories for uninterrupted manufacturing operations.

The adviser said that industrial growth had either stagnated or declined in the previous year, necessitated by the slowdown in energy consumption. It was also noted that the industry has been in a state of "wait and see" for a long time because of past mismanagement and "shaky" in the sector. As a result, industries are losing their capacity to generate employment, economic growth.

Nothing that the ongoing industrial reform may take time, leading business leaders to a meeting with government officials Saturday. The industry leaders expressed their growing concern over the industrial sector's current state and requested immediate attention.

They urged the government to stop "shaky" in the gas transmission system and meet the industrial sector's demand for gas. The industry leaders also expressed their concern over the gas shortage and its impact on industrial production. They said that the government is going to address the energy crisis by opening up the energy sector.

Key points from the meeting:
- 70% of gas found in Dhaka, but cannot be tapped due to lack of pipelines.
- Tk 2.5 bn saved from import of gas monthly fuel.
- List of LNG importers also reviewed.
- Industries sector facing a sharp slowdown.
- 200 factories have already boarded and 300 more on the verge of closure.
- Coal use in power plants may be considered.
- Industrial leaders in Dhaka, including Shree Ananda Gas, are trying to set up a gas pipeline to supply gas to industrial areas.

Defer LDC graduation by 3 years: BCI

The government should take steps to defer Bangladesh's United Nations status graduation from a less developed country (LDC) to a developing one by at least three years, said the Bangladesh Chamber of Industries (BCI) yesterday.

"We are not ready for LDC graduation right now. Why should we concern ourselves outside?" said BCI President Anwar ul Alam Chowdhury at a press briefing organized by the BCI in the capital.

He also shared his concerns over the country's economic challenges and business climate.

Chowdhury alleged that the previous Awami League government pursued the LDC graduation based on inflated economic figures in order to portray an achievement.

"If the graduation is not deferred, the economy will face a massive collapse," he said.

The garment and textile sector, which accounts for 40 percent of manufacturing employment and contributes roughly 85 percent of exports, will bear the brunt of the challenges, he added.

Chowdhury said Vietnam would enjoy zero tariff access to the European Union (EU) from 2027, while European imports of Bangladeshi garments would face a 12 percent duty from 2029.

"We strongly believe that the graduation period should be deferred by at least three years," he said.

Other business platforms earlier also recommended the deferral.

But Education and Planning Adviser Wladimir Marfud had pointed out that Bangladesh had no option to adopt the deferral.

Members of a committee which prepared a white paper on the state of Bangladesh's economy also advised the government not to rush the LDC graduation.

About the current economic situation, Chowdhury alleged that the incumbent government was trying to divert the country's attention from the economic challenges.

He criticized the government's entrepreneurs, who are already grappling with rising costs and operational uncertainties," he said.

Chowdhury also raised concerns about branding entrepreneurs as defectors or defaulters, without considering the systemic challenges they face.

"The burden of banking irregularities caused by few individuals or groups is being unfairly placed on the shoulders of all entrepreneurs. Many defectors are victims of rising operational costs and adverse conditions," he said.

Calling for the introduction of bankruptcy laws, Chowdhury added, "If the government fails to provide protection, entrepreneurs will be forced to shut down their businesses. This gap in legal infrastructure must be urgently addressed."

BCI President Anwar-Ul Alam Chowdhury focusing on six key issues amidst probable US trade

Bangladesh is dealing with one of its most challenging political and economic shifts, and the US tariff hike could worsen the situation.

This could turn out to be a big problem for the economy, especially for the ready-made garment (RMG) industry, which is Bangladesh's primary export item.

The tariff rate ends up being imposed. It could badly hurt the industry and cause foreign investors to lose interest in the country.

"This tariff is not just a policy shift—it is a crisis," said Anwar-Ul Alam Chowdhury, president of the Bangladesh Chamber of Industries (BCI), in an interview with the Daily Star.

It could trigger factory closures, massive job losses, and long-term damage to our export base," he said.

In his assessment, Chowdhury warned that unless six critical trade lines were addressed, Bangladesh risks slipping into a cycle of stagnation, while regional competitors surge ahead.

Four of the six issues are challenges in the complex and labour regulation reforms, including gas and power supplies, and vulnerabilities in the financial and banking sectors.

The remaining two are budgetary and inconsistent trade in policies and the need to safeguard the future of exports and manufacturing.

Chowdhury commented that rising crime and violence often linked to elements of the past, along with political and demoralized law enforcement agencies and bureaucratic

inefficiencies, were undermining law and order.

This is also weakening governance and eroding public and investor confidence. "We are a crossroads. Bangladesh must act boldly and decisively or risk losing relevance," he said.

According to Chowdhury, the US goes political landscape—triggered by US-China trade tensions, war-induced supply chain realignments, and evolving Indo-Pacific strategies—has opened a rare window for Bangladesh.

He warned that delays in reform would divert investments from its bordering neighbours like Vietnam, India, and Indonesia, factories in Bangladesh are under immense pressure, he said.

The RMG sector, which generates more than 80 percent of the country's export earnings, has reported over \$400 million in production losses due to factory shutdowns caused by labour unrest and confidence uncertainties, said the BCI president.

The textiles, ceramics, and leather sectors are also facing a severe energy crisis, with frequent power cuts and gas shortages forcing operations to be scaled down, he said.

Many manufacturers are struggling to stay afloat amid soaring costs of oil, gas, and electricity, and delayed government response, he said.

"We are paying the price for years of underinvestment in energy and infrastructure. Inefficient energy supply is the single biggest threat to our industrial backbone," he added.

Mounting blackouts and erratic gas supply has disrupted production across sectors. The reliance on costly LNG, which has proven unviable, if we don't secure energy, we can't grow, he said.

that simple," he said. In spite of recommendations made by policy experts for years, Bangladesh continues to rank poorly in the ease of doing business, bogged down by delays in tax refunds, customs clearance, and factory registration processes, he said.

Although Bangladesh has a young and growing labour force, employers struggle to find job-ready graduates. "We are producing degrees, not skills," said Chowdhury.

He advocated for stronger links between universities and industries, and returns in technical education and private sector-led training programs. "Our demographic dividend is becoming a liability. That must change," he said.

The BCI president highlighted that overdependence on garments for that overdependence is a critical foreign currency earnings is a critical vulnerability, especially in the post-loss developed country (LDC) era when duty-free market access will be phased out.

He said Bangladesh's LDC graduation would involve critical trade benefits, including waivers and preferential access enabled by the Trade-Related Aspects of Intellectual Property Rights (TRIPS) agreement, which establishes minimum standards for intellectual property protection.

"Graduation is irreversible. Without protection, we will lose markets," he said.

The pharmaceutical industry remains heavily reliant on imported active pharmaceutical ingredients (APIs) and pharmaceutical equipment. "Fast production, policy consistency, and regulatory products in overseas markets will be difficult, he said.

"If we don't prepare the sector, we risk being overtaken by Indian and Chinese firms, both locally and globally," he said.

Chowdhury also highlighted workers' concerns. He drew comparisons with the US and India. "Prudently, subsidies of 30 percent capital machinery, low interest loans, and Vietnam offers the US at \$100 million, China at \$500 million, and Indonesia at \$1 billion," he said.

He called for a strong sector, major agreements (FTAs), and economic processes, and income growth.

"The delay in our best export, jobs, can't expect, instead the political future. BCI president Chowdhury, the BCI investment (BII) has expressed concerns over unprofessionalism, corruption, and rising political risk.

"We need judicial reform, a strong framework. On the back, he stressed.

The BCI president called for a current, uncorrupted framework of doing business, and a strong regulatory framework to negotiate trade, markets, and resource "reform" is the long-term goal, he said.

1 Incorporation and Objectives

1.01 Incorporation

Bangladesh Chamber of Industries (BCI) (here-in after referred to as the Chamber) was incorporated on 29 January, 1985. It is registered under the related articles of Trade Organization Ordinance 1961 and was registered with the Registrar of Joint Stock Companies and Firms Dhaka, Bangladesh. The registered office is located at Edison Prime (8th Floor), 261/C, Tejgaon I/A, Nabisco Bus Stand, Dhaka-1208.

1.02 Board of Directors

2.04 Components of the financial statements

- iii) Statement of Cash Flows for the year ended 30 June 2025
- iv) Notes to the Financial Statements including a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

2.05 Basis of Accounting

These financial statements have been prepared under historical cost convention and in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) and International Accounting Standards (IAS). Since the organization operates without equity, the Statement of Changes in Equity is not applicable for these financial statements.

2.06 Functional and presentation currency

These financial statements are prepared in Bangladesh Taka (Taka/ BDT), which is the Organization functional currency. All financial information presented in Taka has been rounded off to the nearest integer.

2.07 Use of estimates and judgments

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with IASs and IFRSs requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

In particular, information about significant areas of estimation, uncertainty and critical judgments in applying accounting policies that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognized in the financial statements is included in the following notes:

2.08 Reporting period

The Organization follows July-June as reporting period. These financial statements cover the period starting from 01 July 2024 to 30 June 2025.

2.09 Going concern

The Organization has adequate resources to continue in operation for the foreseeable future and hence, the financial statements have been prepared on going concern basis. As per management assessment there are no material uncertainties related to events or conditions which may cast significant doubt upon the Company's ability to continue as a going concern.

2.10 Offsetting

The Organization does not offset assets and liabilities or income and expenses, unless required or permitted by IFRS.

2.11 Materiality and aggregation

The Organization presents separately each material class of similar items and items of a dissimilar nature or function unless they are immaterial. Financial statements result from processing large numbers of transactions or other events that are aggregated into classes according to their nature or function.

2.12 Management's responsibility in preparation and presentation of financial statements

The Management of the Organization is responsible for the preparation and presentation of the financial statements in accordance with the applicable laws and regulations (stated in statement of compliance note no. 2.01 and maintains such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of the financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

3 Significant Accounting Policies:**3.01 Principle of accounting policies**

The specific accounting policies selected and applied by the Organization management for significant transactions and events that have material effect within the framework of IAS-1 Presentation of Financial Statements, in preparation and presentation of financial statements have been consistently applied throughout the year and were also consistent with those used in earlier years.

3.02 Transactions with related parties

During the reporting period, transactions with related parties occurred. Balances with related parties are disclosed in note 19: Related party disclosure.

3.03 Financial instruments

A financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity.

Financial assets

A financial asset is a liquid asset that derives its value from a contractual right or ownership claim. Financial assets carried in the statement of financial position include cash and cash equivalents only.

Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities, as defined by IFRS 9, encompass any future sacrifices of economic benefits that an entity is obliged to make as a result of past transactions or other past activities. These future sacrifices can take the form of payments in the form of money or services owed to other parties. In the statement of financial position, financial liabilities include items such as accrued expenses.

Accrued and other payables, accrued for expenses

Trade and other payables, as well as liabilities for expenses, are recognized when contractual obligations arising from past events are certain, and settlement of these obligations is expected to result in an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits from the company. Trade and other payables, Accrued for expenses are initially recognized at the transaction price, which corresponds to the fair value of the consideration received. Following their initial recognition, trade and other payables are subsequently measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method.

3.04 Statement of cash flows

Statement of Cash Flows is prepared in accordance with IAS 7 Statement of Cash Flows and the cash flow from the operating activities are shown under the direct method.

3.05 Accounts & other receivables

Accounts & other receivable are financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. Such assets are recognized initially at fair value plus any directly attributable transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition, accounts & other receivable are measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method.

3.06 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand and cash at banks which are held by the Organization without any restriction.

3.07 Accruals, provisions and contingencies

i) Accruals

Accruals are liabilities to pay for goods or services that have been received or supplied but have not been paid, invoiced or formally agreed with the supplier, including amounts due to employees. Accrued are reported as part of accounts payable.

ii. Provisions

A provision is recognized in the statement of financial position when the Organization holds a legal or constructive obligation stemming from a past event, and it is likely that an outflow of economic benefits will be needed to fulfill this obligation. Additionally, there should be a dependable estimate available for the amount of this obligation. Provisions are usually valued at the most accurate estimate of the expenditure needed to settle the existing obligation as of the statement of financial position date.

In cases where the impact of the time value of money is significant, the provision's value is determined by calculating the present value of the expected expenditures required to settle the obligation. This guideline aligns with IAS 37 Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets.

iii. Contingent asset

Contingent asset is a possible asset that arises from past events and whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the entity.

iv. Contingent liability

Contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events and whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the entity.

3.08 Revenue recognition

All income and expenses, except for donations, are recognized on an accrual basis. Certificate of origin (CO) fees, attestation fees, recommendation letter fees, election income, and donations are recognized as income on a cash basis upon receipt. Any amounts received that relate to periods after 30 June 2025 are accounted for as liabilities.

3.09 Property, plant & equipment (PPE):

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Cost includes expenditure directly attributable to the acquisition and installation of the assets. Repairs and maintenance expenses are charged to revenue when incurred.

3.10 Subsequent expenditure

The cost of replacing part of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognised in the carrying amount of the item if it is probable that the future economic benefits embodied within the part will flow to the association and its cost can be measured reliably. The costs of the day-to-day servicing of property, plant and equipment are recognized in the statement of comprehensive income as incurred.

3.11 Depreciation:

Fixed assets are depreciated by applying is charged on reducing balance method for each of Property, Plant and Equipment for the year. Depreciation has been charged from the date when the asset is ready for use and no depreciation has been charged when the assets are sold/ disposed off.

3.12 Taxation

Current tax is the expected tax payable on taxable income for the year, based on tax rates and tax laws which are enacted at the reporting date, including any adjustment for tax payable in previous periods as per IAS 12 Income Taxes. In accordance with income tax SRO 210/2012, dated 01 July 2013, the chamber's all income is exempted from tax except income from interest and income from business of the Chamber. In computing the income tax provision for the current year, corporate tax rate is determined to be @27.5% as per the Finance Act, 2023.

3.13 General:
